#### Community profile

519,000	Population (Fastest growing city in Ontario, 4 <sup>th</sup> fastest in Canada)
29%	Londoner's identify as a visible minority
3 in 4	London's new residents are immigrants
11,000	Indigenous people in London, making up 2.6% of the population.
\$18.05/hr	Living wage in London (Minimum wage \$16.55, deficit gap to COL for single person is \$817/month, Ontario Living Wage Network)

Oneida of the Thames & Chippewa of the Thames, 2 of 3 FN's reserves in London & Middlesex, currently have boil water advisories (*Chippewa since 12/14/2022 & Oneida since 9/1/2019*)

2<sup>nd</sup> highest poverty rate (behind Windsor) of the region's seven major cities with 10.6% of the population unable to afford a set list of modest necessities including food, shelter, clothing and transportation (Statistics Canada)

384,477 people used the Food Bank in 2023, an increase of 42% over 2022. 6,075 families attended in November, the highest demand for assistance in its 35-year history. 40% of those individuals are children. Inflation, housing, low social assistance rates & precarious work increase demand. 70% of Food Banks Ontario are unsure if they'll have enough food to meet the need in their communities. (LFP, Dec 6, 2023)
